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APPROPRIATIONS

By law, the 2017-2018 School District Budget is broken into an Administrative Component, a Program Component, and a Capital Component.

Administrative Budget Component: These expenditures include office and administrative costs; salaries and benefits for certified school administrators who spend 50 percent or more of their time performing supervisory duties; data processing; public information; legal fees; property insurance; and school board expenses.

Program Budget Component: These expenditures include salaries and benefits of teachers and instructional staff members who spend the majority of their time teaching; instructional costs such as supplies, equipment and textbooks; co-curricular activities and interscholastic athletics; staff development; student support services; and transportation operating costs.

Capital Budget Component: These expenditures include school bus purchases, debt service on buildings, and leasing expenditures; tax certiorari and court-ordered costs; and all facility costs, including salaries and benefits of the custodial staff; service contracts, maintenance supplies and equipment; and utilities.

The New York State Education Department provides the account codes that make up each of these components. Employee benefits are allocated to each of the three components based on salary.

Note: For the Poughkeepsie City School District, the Program Component (teaching and learning/instruction) comprises 79.82% of the District's budget. The Administrative Component comprises 10.41% of the District's budget. Capital comprises 9.77% of the District's budget.

REVENUES

The sources of revenue for the District are the following: State Aid at \$66,626,793, which is 68.87% of the budget; the Tax Levy of \$27,561,990 which is 28.49% of the budget; Appropriated Fund Balance, \$1,259,647 which is 1.30% of the budget, and other revenue sources (i.e., Payment in Lieu of Taxes, Medicaid Reimbursement) totaling \$1,298,623 which is 1.34% of the budget.

The change in the tax levy from the 2016-2017 school year to the 2017-2018 school year is 1.34% due to the tax cap, which is at the maximum tax levy calculation based on the state-wide tax cap.

In the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 general fund budgets Smart Schools bond program revenues and expenditure estimates were included in the budget totals. State guidance now makes it clear that Smart Schools bond funds should be accounted for in the capital fund budget and not the general fund. Therefore it has been removed from the 2017-2018 general fund budget.

The district has been allocated money for the Smart Schools bond program. The access of the funds requires a Smart Schools Investment Plan, under the advisement of an Architect, to be submitted to SED for approval. Then once approved, the district can purchase equipment and services that fits the plan and submit for reimbursement.

Note: Maximum Allowable Levy- The tax levy limit or tax cap plus allowable exemptions result in the maximum allowable tax levy, which is the highest tax levy a school district can propose and still only need a simple majority to pass the budget. The board has not decided to seek a property tax cap override for the 2017-2018 budget vote.

Note: The 2017-2018 budget vote will take place on May 16, 2017.

Business Office

<u>Administrative Salary</u> – This line item is the salary for the assistant superintendent for finance and operations.

<u>Other Salaries</u> - The business office staff includes the following: a junior accountant, an assistant business manager, an account clerk, a payroll clerk, a payroll/benefits clerk, and an administrative school secretary. Six employees total. Removal of HR administrator requires inclusion of payroll/benefits clerk. Junior accountant salary was missing from 16-17 adopted budget.

<u>Equipment</u> – This line item is to replace equipment in the business office.

<u>Contractual</u> - Co-op bidding fees, equipment maintenance agreements, professional dues and publications, legal library updates, postage meter rental, equipment repairs and 403(b) compliance.

<u>Postage</u> - Postage used by the entire administration building.

Staff Development - Staff training and travel for the business office staff.

<u>Supplies</u> - Various supplies for the business office and copy paper for the entire administration building.

BOCES - Dutchess County co-op bidding and state aid planning services and contract analysis.

Auditing

Contractual - Annual independent audit fees.

<u>Claims Auditor</u> - Fee to have all invoices reviewed and approved by the claims auditor. Internal Auditor – Fee for the internal auditor.

Treasurer

Salary - Salary of the treasurer and deputy treasurer.

<u>Contractual</u> - Costs associated with the issuance of the District's annual revenue anticipation note.

Supplies – This line item includes necessary supplies for the treasurer.

Tax Collector

<u>Salary</u> - Salary of the tax collector and substitutes/deputy collector(s). <u>Contractual</u> - Postage and printing of the school tax bills. <u>Tax Collection Fees</u> - The fee paid to process District tax payments. <u>Supplies</u> - Tax bill forms, envelopes and other supplies.

Fiscal Agent Fees

Contractual – Fees for financial advisors for long term borrowing.

Contractual - Microfilming and other costs to maintain District records.

Public Information

<u>Contractual</u> – Printing of the Poughkeepsie Pride, participation in the Dutchess County Regional Chamber of Commerce events, and local community services.

<u>BOCES</u> –All public information services for the District are provided through BOCES, which includes the use of BOCES staff, production equipment, and document development.

The Budget for 2017-18 will decrease from the budgeted total for 2016-17. The ERS rate used for 2016-2017 was 15.5% 2017-18 is 15.50%.

<u>Teachers Retirement</u> - District contribution into the teachers' retirement system. Tier 3 and 4 employees contribute 3% of their salaries for the first ten years of their employment. The Budget for 2017-18 decreased from the budgeted total for 2016-17. The TRS rate used for 2016-17 was 11.72% and 2017-18 is 9.80%.

<u>Social Security</u> - District contribution of 6.2% for OASDI and 1.45% for Medicare of an employee's gross salary.

<u>Workers Compensation</u> - Workers Compensation insurance premiums will continue to increase based upon increase in payrolls, maximum weekly wage, and loss experience. There is a 6.4% increase for 2017-18

Life Insurance - Group term life insurance for administrators as per contract.

<u>Unemployment Insurance</u> - Unemployment benefits for District employees are anticipated to increase during the 2016-17 school year. District layoffs continue to be the result of economic factors and reduced state-aid.

<u>Health Insurance</u> - Health insurance costs for District staff and retirees are increasing by an estimated 16%.

Dental & Vision Insurance - Dental and vision insurance costs per negotiated contracts.

Medicare Reimbursement - Payments to retired employees receiving social security.

<u>PPSTA Welfare Fund</u> - The contribution for 2017-18 is \$1,713 per teacher for additional benefits.

Maintenance

<u>Maintenance Salaries</u> - Salaries of the acting director of facilities and operations and the staff of 10 maintenance support staff.

<u>Maintenance Salaries – Overtime</u> - Staff to cover events, activities, and/or projects during nontraditional hours.

<u>Clerical Salary –</u> 1 clerical employee split $\frac{1}{2}$ in maintenance and the second half in transportation.

<u>Equipment</u> - This amount is for the purchase of security cameras or security related equipment, lockers, buildings and grounds and other equipment as needed to maintain District facilities. Grounds - Maintenance on the 46 acres of District-owned grounds.

<u>Repairs</u> - District-wide repairs including maintenance contracts on equipment.

Rubbish Removal - Dump fees for rubbish and roll-off containers, as needed.

Fire and Boiler Insurance - Insurance on all boilers.

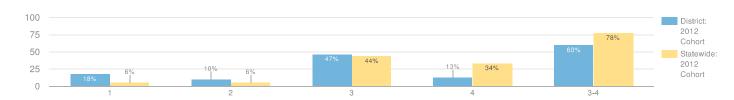
TOTAL COHORT RESULTS IN SECONDARY-LEVEL MATHEMATICS AFTER FOUR YEARS OF INSTRUCTION

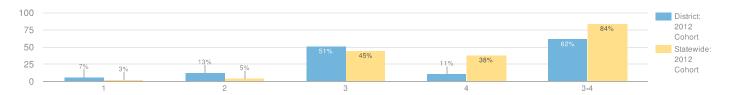

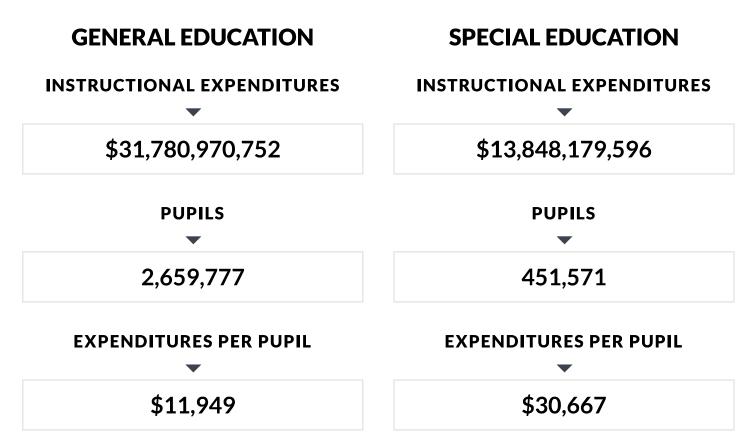

Instructional Expenditures for General Education are K-12 expenditures for classroom instruction (excluding Special Education) plus a proration of building level administrative and instructional support expenditures. These expenditures include amounts for instruction of students with disabilities in a general-education setting. District expenditures, such as transportation, debt service and district-wide administration are not included.

The pupil count for General Education is K-12 average daily membership plus K-12 pupils for whom the district pays tuition to another school district. This number represents all pupils, including those classified as having disabilities and those not classified, excluding only students with disabilities placed out of district. Pupils resident in the district but attending a charter school are included. For districts in which a county jail is located, this number includes incarcerated youth to whom the district must provide an education program.

Instructional Expenditures for Special Education are K-12 expenditures for students with disabilities (including summer special education expenditures) plus a proration of building-level administrative and instructional support expenditures. District expenditures, such as transportation, debt service and district-wide administration are not included.

The pupil count for Special Education is a count of K-12 students with disabilities for the school year plus students for whom the district receives tuition from another district plus students for whom the district pays tuition to another district. Students attending the State schools at Rome and Batavia, private placements and out-of-state placements are included.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES PER PUPIL



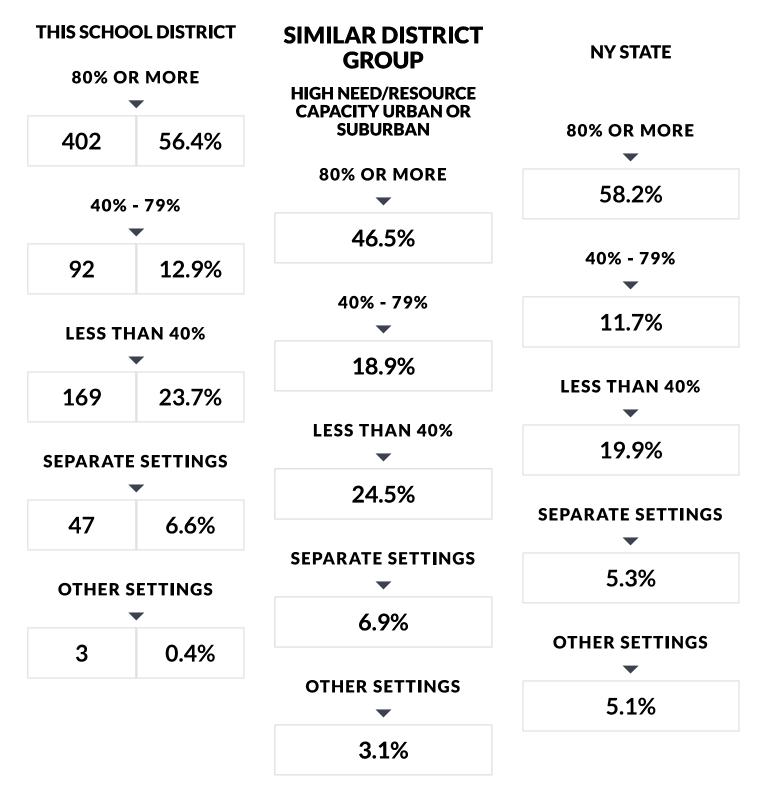

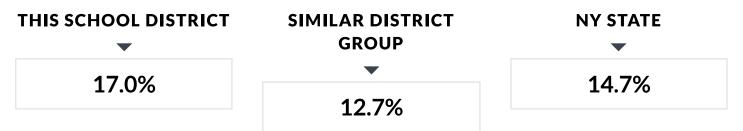
STUDENT PLACEMENT (PERCENT OF TIME INSIDE REGULAR CLASSROOM)
