## Purpose of the Study

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Gathering stakeholder feedback is an important part of developing any school or district improvement plan. New York State requires Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) and Target Districts (TD) to engage their stakeholders with a Diagnostic Tool for School and District Effectiveness (DTSDE) Survey as they develop their improvement plans.

The Poughkeepsie City School District DTSDE Survey asked parents, instructional staff, and students in grades 3-12 for feedback on several key school and district topics to inform improvement efforts across the district and in every school.

K12 *Insight* partnered with Elena Rosado-Kozlowski, secretary to interim chief finance and business official, to develop the DTSDE Survey, which addressed the following six tenets:

- Systems and Organization
- School Leadership
- Curriculum
- Instruction
- Social-Emotional Learning
- Parent and Community Engagement

# Diagnostic Tool for School and District Effectiveness (DTSDE) Tenets

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## **Systems and Organization**

Effective schools establish school-wide systems and structures that promote continuous improvement and success for all students.

## **Curriculum**

Effective schools provide students with rigorous, coherent, and relevant curricula that prepares all students for success.

## **Parent and Community Engagement**

Effective schools develop a systematic approach to Family and Community Engagement to empower parents to effectively advocate for their child's learning and for the improvement of the school.

## **School Leadership**

Visionary leaders create a school community and culture that leads to success, well-being, and high academic outcomes for all students.

## **Social-Emotional Learning**

Effective schools develop a systematic approach to Social-Emotional Learning to ensure that all students can develop social-emotional learning skills necessary for success within and beyond school.

## **Instruction**

Effective teachers engage with students in a manner that promotes mastery and allows students to stretch their knowledge and deepen their understanding.

# Understanding the Results

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The survey was open from May 20 to June 24.

Email invitations with unique survey links were sent to instructional staff and parents. Parents also could participate via a public link on the district’s website and through social media. The survey was translated into Spanish.

Students used their student IDs to access the survey in school.

Pre-survey communications included a letter to instructional staff, a letter to parents, and an announcement on the district website.

This report summarizes survey results and breaks them down by parents, instructional staff, elementary students (grades 3-5), and secondary students (grades 6-12). Results are compared with those from 2017-2018, 2018-2019, and 2020-2021. Additional reports provided include item-level responses and school-level results.

Results do not reflect random sampling; therefore, they should not be generalized to all district parents, instructional staff, and students in grades 3-12. Rather, results reflect only the perceptions and opinions of survey participants.

Findings for each item in the report exclude participants who did not answer. In charts and graphs, data labels less than 5 percent are not shown. Percentages may not total 100 due to rounding.



## DTSDE Tenets: Comparison by Respondent Type






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# Participation by School and Grade

What school does your child attend? (N=317)




What is your child(ren)'s grade(s)? (N=315)




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# Participation by School






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# Participation by School and Grade


Where do you go to school? (N=499)




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# Participation by School and Grade


Which school do you attend? (N=776)

## Key Insights

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- Participating parents had increases in favorable responses (Strongly Agree or Agree responses for all items within each tenet) across five of the six tenets. Curriculum had the highest level of overall agreement at 71%, an increase of 3 percentage points from last school year. They had the lowest level of overall agreement with the Parent and Community Engagement and the School Leadership tenets at 59%, an increase of 4 percentage points and 5 percentage points, respectively.
  - Two of the five highest-ranking indicators fell within the Social-Emotional Learning tenet. For example, 85% of participating parents strongly agreed or agreed that their child works hard, even in the face of major challenges or crises.
  - However, two of the five lowest-ranking indicators also fell within the Social-Emotional Learning tenet. 39% of participating parents disagreed or strongly disagreed that students do not threaten and/or bully each other and 38% disagreed or strongly disagreed that students do not threaten and/or cyberbully each other.
- Participating instructional staff had increases in favorability for five of the six tenets. They had the highest level of overall agreement with the Instruction tenet at 84%, the same as last school year. They had the lowest level of overall agreement with the Systems and Organization tenet at 42%, an increase of 12 percentage points.
  - All five highest-ranking indicators fell within the Instruction tenet. For example, 97% of participating instructional staff agreed or strongly agreed that they regularly use data to identify their students' strengths and weaknesses.
  - All five lowest-ranking indicators fell within the Systems and Organization tenet. A majority of participating instructional staff disagreed or strongly disagreed that their school is well maintained with working heat, adequate lighting, and well-kept grounds (78%); that district leaders are visible in their school (70%); that their school is clean (69%); that district leaders clearly explain the reasons behind decisions on key issues (67%); and that district leaders openly communicate about important changes in the district (58%).

## Key Insights (Continued)

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- Participating elementary students had increases in favorable responses in three of the six tenets. They had the highest overall agreement with the Curriculum tenet at 85%, the same as last school year. They had the lowest overall agreement with the Parent and Community Engagement tenet at 60%, also the same as last school year.
  - Three out of the five highest-ranking indicators fell within the Curriculum tenet. For example, 92% of participating elementary students said that their teachers want them to do their best.
  - Two out of the five lowest-ranking indicators fell within the Parent and Community Engagement tenet. 38% of participating elementary students disagreed or strongly disagreed that their families help out at school and 33% disagreed or strongly disagreed that their families go to school events, such as games or plays.
- Participating secondary students had increases in favorability across all six tenets. Curriculum had the highest level of overall agreement at 75%, an increase of 5 percentage points. They had the lowest level of overall agreement with the Parent and Community Engagement tenet at 40%, an increase of 2 percentage points.
  - Two of the five highest-ranking indicators fell within the Curriculum tenet. For example, 91% of participating secondary students said that their teachers expect them to do their best.
  - Three of the five lowest-ranking indicators fell within the Parent and Community Engagement tenet. 74% of participating secondary students disagreed or strongly disagreed that they do community service with other students from their school, 73% disagreed or strongly disagreed that they have family members who volunteer at their school, and 49% disagreed or strongly disagreed that their family attends school events, such as games, plays, and fundraisers.
- Bullying/fighting once again appeared as a lowest-ranking indicator for parents and both student participant groups.

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
