

## Spring budget news heads to homes



The Spring 2023 Budget Newsletter is slated to arrive at residents' homes this week, ahead of the May 16 budget and Board of Education vote.

The newsletter contains extensive information about the proposed Poughkeepsie City School District 2023-2024 budget, profiles of PCSD valedictorian and salutatorian, district accomplishments\*, information about the district's Community Schools Initiative, arts education highlights, and the capital project. The \$135.9 million budget will enable the district to maintain staff and programming, originally supported by COVID relief dollars, and expand student programming, resources, and personnel focused on supporting the transformation efforts of the district. The budget newsletter also contains information about expanding the Strong Schools Equal Strong Communities Capital Improvement Project that will generate approximately \$26 million dollars of district wide facilities improvements at no additional cost to taxpayers. As with previous years, the 2023-2024 budget remains below the state authorized tax level with an increase of just 2.15 percent, which is less than the tax level limit of 4.04 percent In the development of the budget, a special emphasis was placed on

expanding the district's support of students with exceptionalities, English Language Learners, Community Schools, arts education, and instructional programming to support new occupational pathways for students, district wide auditorium upgrades and student instructional furniture upgrades. In this year's board elections, voters will elect two (2) candidates to fill two seats on the five-member Board of Education. Two members of the Board of Education will be elected due to the expiration of the term of Thomas O'Neill, Esq. and Bob Creedon. The two candidates running for the two (2) seats are as follows in the order they will appear on the ballot:

- Thomas O'Neil, Esq.
- Bob Creedon

### Unified basketball team makes district debut

Students with Exceptionalities are now provided with opportunity and access to the sport of basketball in the Poughkeepsie City School District's effort to create equity for all students. Under the leadership of Peter Bianco, executive director of physical education, health services, athletics and recreation, and Dr. Iris Goliger, executive director of students with exceptionalities, this opportunity has been made available to this population. Bowling is being planned for next school year.

Both sports will be the first of their kind to be made available to students with exceptionalities in the Poughkeepsie City School District.

The New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) and Special Olympics New York offer Unified Sports to NYSPHSAA member schools. Students are playing a six game schedule this spring, competing against teams from W appingers Central School District, New Paltz Central School District, Red Hook School District, Newburgh Enlarged City School District, Arlington Central School District, and Kingston City School District. To date, under the coaching of JayQuan Floyd, head coach and PHS teacher, the team is undefeated.

"It touches my heart in a very personal way to witness what the Poughkeepsie City School District is doing to champion the positive youth development of all students. Our students with exceptionalities having access to a sport that will contribute to their cherished memories of high school and also develop so many motor and intellectual skills is a major milestone in our larger body of work", shared Dr. Rosser, superintendent of schools.

As some are aware, Dr. Rosser had a brother (now deceased) with Down Syndrome, who played basketball recreationally and for the Special Olympics. He was the biggest fan of the sport and of Dr. Rosser when he played basketball in high school and college.

"Unified sports has made a tremendous difference for all of our students here at Poughkeepsie High School. Not only are the students who are on the roster benefiting from the social and physical participation but also our students who come and cheer them on. Unified Sports are here to stay!" shared coaches Floyd and Lynnece Edmond.

missing against a blue backdrop. It was inspired by a picture that Lawson told him to enhance, which made the message stronger. For Kladakis, he is hopeful that people are encouraged to not judge deaf people after seeing the poster.


"It's not really all that hard to be kind to people," Kladakis said. "If it's someone that can't hear, it's not right to just judge them on that." While Frederick does not know anyone personally who is deaf, she was nonetheless happy to design a Japanese Manga-styled poster that displays the phrase "Can we be friends?" in sign language to highlight how a simple conversation for deaf people can be a struggle due to their impairment. Frederick hopes this encourages people to reach out to deaf people.

"They want to move past the barrier to talk to you, to get to you," Frederick said. "We want to get to know them as a person, not just that they're deaf."

This is not the first time Frederick has had her work recognized on a larger scale – her design was chosen to be the official logo for the 2023 Hudson Valley Polar Plunge held in February.
