Youth have many options for summer

Creating opportunities for children is a key component of summer programs offered through various organizations throughout the City of Poughkeepsie. This is true for the Poughkeepsie City School District, which, through its offerings and those offered by partners, wants to show the community how it is a champion for children.

Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet's study found that students spend 80 percent of their time outside of school and only 20 percent in school.

Natasha Brown, executive director of community schools for the district, said "The district wanted to expand the amount of time students were engaged in active learning during the summer."

City of Poughkeepsie Youth Director Karen Williams said the main goal of the city programs are to keep students off the streets and engaged in productive activities. "The hope is to decrease delinquency," Williams said.

To that end, the school district, city and various community organizations are offering and promoting numerous options for youth this summer. Below are some of the programs being offered. Please check with your favorite organization to see if they are offering other programs.

Poughkeepsie City School District

Capital improvement project and other construction work is impacting the district's ability to host summer programs in schools. So, the district is providing scholastic summer enrichment packets for all students grades K-5 that will provide reading and math books and activities.

In addition, the following summer programs are being offered:

- Extraordinary Youth Summer Camp at Poughkeepsie Middle School is a free Community Schools collaboration with Community Matters 2, Charlia Frank and Growing Stemz. Activities include environmental exploration, citizen's science, reading comprehension, social-emotional learning, swimming, 3D printing, STEAM, storytelling, music, dance drones & coding, health & fitness, arts & crafts, soccer and field trips. It is open to students in kindergarten through sixth grade. Limited to 140 students, the camp runs Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m.-3 p.m. beginning July 5 and ending Aug. 16. Breakfast and lunch is served. As of 6/14/23 there is a waiting list, please call the Parent Empowerment Center at 845-451-4900 ext. 1425 to be added to it.
- Camp Nooteeming offers a variety of activities for students and Dutchess County granted full scholarships and transportation for 150 PCSD students. Camp runs July 6-Aug. 3 from 9 a.m.-1p.m. Monday through Thursday. Priority was given to Summer Lights and Extraordinary Youth Summer Camp participants and a waiting list has been established. Call the Parent Empowerment Center at 845-451-4900 ext. 1425 to be added to it. You may also contact Dutchess County Youth Services about other possible attendance opportunities at 845-486-3288.
- **Credit recovery** at Poughkeepsie High School provides an opportunity for students who want to make up work or classes they are missing. Registration information will be available soon.



City of Poughkeepsie programs

- City of Poughkeepsie Youth Football League wants to get students ages 7-14 back into the park and involved in something positive through flag football program. It runs from the third week of August through November. The program is free. Call 845-554-7304 or email charter1966@hotmail.com

Community partners

Many of these programs received funding from the City of Poughkeepsie through its Youth Opportunity Grants. Applications are reviewed by a board and then a decision is made on which programs receive funding.

The Art Effect offers summer art camps for children ages 5-10 that give children a chance to create fine art, digital media and performing art while building self-confidence, creative thinking and developing art making techniques with professional artists and experienced teachers. Tonight: District's first all-elementary musical

For the first time, fourth and fifth graders from all four district elementary schools are coming together tonight and tomorrow to perform a musical open to the community.

The kids version of "Aladdin," at Krieger Elementary School, 6 p.m., features a cast and crew of about 30 students under the direction of Krieger teacher Nicole Schmitt. The show is about 45 minutes in length. Students were selected for roles based on a virtual audition for which they submitted a recording of themselves, Schmitt said. The main characters are: Aladdin, played by Noah Adamson and Emmanuel Orrego (each has a night); Genie, Harriet Luongo; Jasmine, Sarai Harrell and Jafar, Londyn Cummings. Since mid-March, the cast and crew have met and rehearsed three days a week for two hours each day. "We had a conversation and Krieger has done shows but the other schools hadn't done any and we wanted to give the other schools an opportunity to participate,"

Schmitt said.

The district funded the costs associated with the performance, including the purchase of a spotlight to help highlight the performers.
