

Nov. 7 vote impacts district projects

Next week registered voters will have an opportunity to vote on a very important ballot proposal that impacts small city school districts like Poughkeepsie, Beacon, Albany, Binghamton and 53 other districts throughout New York.

Currently, these districts have difficulty financing capital improvements that range from health and safety projects, HVAC improvements, roofing replacements and facility renovations needed to transform schools to meet the 21st century learning needs of our children. Small city school districts must break large projects into smaller projects over a number of years in order to stay under the 5 percent debt limit cap. This can lead to more costly projects and inefficiencies in maximizing funding to expand projects. The 5 percent debt limit

was created in 1951 when the landscape of our communities were very different from today. Voting **YES** will not affect school or property taxes. It will simply remove an outdated restriction that limits the ability of small city school districts like Poughkeepsie to more efficiently continue our efforts to transform our schools into 21st century learning environments. Voters would still need to approve capital projects.

Normal transportation resumes Monday

Thursday morning the Poughkeepsie City School District yellow bus provider, First Student Transportation, experienced wide scale vandalism at its Town of Poughkeepsie Fitchett Way bus depot. The incident impacted First Student's ability to transport many Poughkeepsie City School District students to and from school on Thursday, Nov. 2.

While it is unknown who the culprit/s responsible for the vandalism are, Town of Poughkeepsie Police are actively investigating.

The Poughkeepsie City School District is working diligently with

First Student Transportation to restore school bus services to all regularly serviced PCSD students. For today, modifications were made to several routes which allowed First Student to restore all routes. It is anticipated that these modifications would only be in effect today. First Student is working to resume normal pick-up times and routes for Monday, Nov. 6, 2023.

In correspondence from the district to parents, it was noted that "First Student and the Poughkeepsie City School District appreciates your understanding during this time. Together, we are working to ensure PCSD students are present in school every day. We appreciate your partnership in making this happen."





Rosser selected for leadership institute

While serving in Washington D.C., and Buffalo, NY, Rosser was a contributing member of the CGCS Males of Color Policy Committee and was a regular presenter at the CGCS Annual Fall Conferences. Rosser is one of nine senior level education administrators selected from over 20 highly qualified nominated leaders representing school districts from across the country.

Runner aspires to help heal animals with cancer

Saniya Jenkins dreams of attending Cornell University and one day operating an animal hospital. The Poughkeepsie High School senior ranks second in her class and is waiting hopefully for an acceptance letter from Cornell.

"I plan on being a veterinarian oncologist," said the district's athlete of the month for September. "I love animals. Like them all."

Jenkins runs cross country, indoor track and outdoor track for Poughkeepsie.

"It's definitely a pleasure due to the fact it's not so much watching her ability get better in terms of her running, it's watching her mindset become stronger and to know where she can achieve more," said varsity cross country and track coach Jason Conrad. "Watching her academically, she's always been strong, but she's become a much more rounded student-athlete with the programs she's in and

keeping her academics up, and participating in track and field and cross country."

Jenkins just completed her senior cross-country season with two wins and a second-place finish in dual meets.

At invitational, Jenkins has dropped six minutes from her time at the start of the season. At the Section I League 1A mega duals on Sept. 12, she was 31st and clocked a time of 33 minutes, 32.20 seconds on Bowdoin Park's challenging course. On Oct. 3, she placed 19th at the Section I League 1A championships with a time of 27:19.8 at Bowdoin Park.

"When I'm running, it feels like I'm flying. I like the feeling. When I run, I feel at peace with myself," she said. Jenkins said her best track events are the middle-distance runs, 600 and 1,000 for indoor and 800 for outdoor.

"I'm trying to make it to the state meet before I graduate," she said. "That's my biggest goal right now when it comes to running."

Jenkins is the daughter of Travis and Adrienne Jenkins and has three siblings, Aubrey, Skyler and Travis. When she's not running, she enjoys reading, studying and participating in JROTC.
