Poughkeepsie High School Senior Peter Sealy is the District Board of Education student liaison for the 2023-2024 school year. The primary function of the board liaison is to ensure that the board and superintendent are aware of issues critical to students, as well as to get feedback from them. School counselor Stacey Lee encouraged Sealy to apply for the position, who noted that he was inspired by the efforts of previous liaisons Harrison Brisbon McKinnon and Gabrihanna Jones.

"I was like, 'OK, I can make a change like them or try to uplift the school,'" Sealy said. "Sometimes people can't speak for themselves and I want to speak for them."

Before his first board meeting Sealy surveyed his fellow students to see what issues they wanted addressed. They voiced concerns about feeling underserved by staff and having better quality

school lunches. "Their input is vital," Sealy said of the students. "It's been eye-opening."

While he was nervous to speak in front of the Board at first, Sealy appreciated them being welcoming to him and receptive to the ideas he presented.

"It shows that I could make a lot of change," Sealy said. "They seem like they're open and want to help the students."

During the year, Sealy will also converse with the PHS Student Government on issues, as well as survey students in Poughkeepsie Middle School and the elementary schools for their opinions.

"They're the future and they always have input," Sealy said of the younger kids. "I plan to go over there to give the future a hand."

Sealy is a member of PHS' National Honor Society chapter and the Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, which he credits with preparing him for public speaking opportunities and performing community service.

"These programs put me in touch with the community," he said. "JROTC is the first program that made me speak."

"This young man is a young man I admire a great deal because of his work ethic and his presence as a member of the JROTC", shared Dr. Eric Jay Rosser, superintendent at the November 1st, 2023 Board meeting." Rosser further stated that he has a lot of confidence that beyond enrollment in the Poughkeepsie City School District, he will continue to do great things for himself and also the community.

Dual language teacher Maribeth Smith worked with Vassar English Language Learners Outreach Program John Bradley to arrange the visit.

"The students were mesmerized by the library," Smith said. "We had a super day."

As part of the <u>District's 5 – Year Strategic Plan</u> preparing students to be career and college-ready is a priority and Ms. Smith wants to expose her young learners to a college environment as early as possible to show them every post-high school opportunity.

"You wait until they're much older, it's just not the same," Smith explained.

Smith was impressed by her students' active engagement both in the museum and on campus, which included asking Richter relevant questions about campus life.

"Now we have so much to talk about in our classroom and so much to write about," she said. "The students came back to the ELC talking about the art and about going to college."
