Tucker earns National Board Certification

Poughkeepsie Middle School's Ann Marie Tucker, school counselor has become the first secondary educator in the Poughkeepsie City School District to achieve National Board Certification. National Board Certification is the most respected professional certification available in education and provides numerous benefits to teachers, students, and schools. The certification was designed to develop, retain, and recognize accomplished teachers and to generate ongoing improvement in schools nationwide.

Tucker, who received the Albert Shanker Grant from the New York

State Education Department to help her with funds to pursue certification, learned on Dec. 9th of her certification and now is the 24th of the 7,588 school counselors in New York State to be certified. Given three years to complete the program, Tucker completed a four-part program in one year.

"I wanted to push myself to my limits as a school counselor and see how I could better serve my students," said Tucker,

Tucker is the second person in her family to achieve National Board Certification. Her mom, retired Newburgh teacher, Ann Marie Healey, earned certification as an elementary school teacher. "I think the certification and the experience she went through to get it is going to continue to help make her a leader in terms of elevating the role of the department and advocacy for the school counseling department, which translates into better services for the students," said PMS SEL counselor Rachel Birsner. "She's a tireless advocate for her students and families, who also has an incredible ability to synthesize all the different facets in a student's life, connecting family, teachers, administrators, and community resources."

Tucker, wife of Brian Tucker and mother of eight-year-old Brian Tucker, will now serve as a facilitator for educators looking to become National Board Certified.

Three Poughkeepsie elementary educators previously earned national certification, and two are still active in the district. "I hope there are more to come," she said.


"Don't you eat my crew!" shouted Dr. Eric Jay Rosser, superintendent of schools, as he read The Gingerbread

the text, and revisit a previous lesson on personifications. Research indicates that interactive read-aloud supports students' interest in print materials, expands knowledge, and supports reading comprehension, all elements in supporting childhood literacy development.

While engaging students in the interactive read-aloud, Rosser received an unexpected telephone call from none other than Santa Claus himself. After the excitement of the children dissipated, Santa Claus asked Rosser to place his cell phone on speaker so that each 1st grader could say their name aloud. Santa then shared with Rosser that he would be delivering something special to him to give the students the week of December 18.

Yesterday, Dr. Rosser, delivered bendable toy gingerbread boys and girls to every child, a copy of <u>The Gingerbread Man</u> book by Scholastic for students to add to their home libraries,

and a few other gingerbread-related items for Haines, including a new addition to her growing gingerbread book collection, The Gingerbread Man Loose at the Zoo.

After much jubilee, Haines gathered the students and provided them with an opportunity to share with Dr. Rosser the various story elements they had been learning in the series of Gingerbread stories they'd read. "I love first grade, Ms. Haines reminds me of my first-grade teacher Mary Rozier, who to this day is my favorite teacher. Like Ms. Rozier, Ms. Haines is nurturing her students' love for reading," shared Rosser.
